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FOREWORD

As the regulator overseeing hydrocarbon operations in Suriname, Staatsolie Hydrocarbon Institute N.V. (SHI) is committed to maximizing the value derived from Suriname's hydrocarbon resources. This includes ensuring that our Production Sharing Contract (PSC) Operators fulfill their Social Responsibility Investment obligations as outlined in the PSCs. This report demonstrates the Contractors' dedication to transparency and social responsibility by highlighting their investments in local communities, sustainable development and the health and well-being of Suriname's people.

In 2024, SHI monitored 16 PSCs, with the 8 Contractors that are active in our basin with an total commitment of USD 2.3 million for Social Responsibility projects. Of this, 1.7 million was spent during 2024. The largest portion of expenditures was directed towards Education and Healthcare, followed by Local Content. These projects can be classified under the 8 categories as illustrated in the figure below:

1. 2024 SOCIAL RESPONSIBILTY INVESTMENT FOCUS

Each Contractor has a unique philosophy and strategy for contributing to social impact. With the continued growth of Suriname's oil sector, Staatsolie Maatschappij Suriname N.V. (Staatsolie) initiated two significant projects, while engaging PSC Operators into these:

- a. Upgrading a technical and vocational training institute;
- b. Supporting the second cohort of the Blue Wave Supplier's Development program.


Furthermore, Staatsolie provides guidance and approves projects that are proposed by the Operators.

16 PSCs have been signed with 8 Operators. Based on the PSCs, an approximate total amount of USD 2.3 million has been committed to Social Responsibility projects. In 2024 a total amount of US\$ 1.7 million was spent in the different categories. The commitment of USD 2.3 million includes the obligation of PetroChina for Block 14 and 15, which will be submitted in 2025.

1.1 EDUCATION

Investing in education is fundamental to fostering empowered, sustainable communities. In 2024, targeted investments aimed at enhancing educational opportunities for individuals of all ages, laying the groundwork for a better future for Suriname.



NATIN (Natuur Technisch Instituut)

• Lab Expansion Project

Making the expansion of NATIN's Process, Electrical Engineering and Chemical Analysts course a strategic move to meet the demand and address the industry evolving needs. This funding will be used to procure items for the Chemical and Electro Laboratory of Natin.

Contribution: KE Suriname (Shell) - USD 50,000

Upgrade NATIN

Phase 1- Designing and implementing an oil and Gas Stream at the NATIN institute, updating of selected curricula and strengthening of the institute.

With the ongoing developments in the offshore oil industry in Suriname, the need for qualified employees for the Oil and Gas Industry is now more than ever a high priority on the agenda of the government.

IOSH Course for NATIN

NATIN has updated the curricula of the following streams, the Mechanical, Electrical and Process technology and has initiated a new curriculum for Oil & Gas sector called "Oil and Gas KOP-programma". As part of this program the IOSH course in Environmental awareness and Workplace safety are included in the Oil and Gas curriculum.

Shell MetaSkills Program 2.0 - STEM & Digital Skills
 This program provided NATIN students with crucial STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) skills and digital literacy, benefiting both teachers and students. Its goal was to raise awareness among educators about the importance of incorporating essential MetaSkills into the curriculum to improve employability and adaptability in the changing job market.

ADEKUS

Upgrade the Geoscience department at the Anton de Kom University
 The Geoscience department of ADEK seeks to strengthen its teaching and research
 capability by integrating advanced software and modern equipment, which will result in
 academic excellence of teachers and students.

• Upgrade classroom Petroleum Geology Master Course

The Master Petroleum Geology course is a broad and interdisciplinary study that is profession oriented. From the start, 60 students graduated, of which 95% work in the oil industry.

With the classroom upgrade, students will have the option to attend classes with the local counterpart present in person while the international lecturer participates remotely, when needed. Additionally, in-person lectures can be recorded for students to revisit while preparing for exams.

MYTYL SCHOOL

Renovation and Maintenance Mytyl School

This project provides a maintained, safe and nice environment for physically impaired pupils and also creates a pleasant workspace for teachers and supervisors.

SUPPORT YOUTH EMPOWERMENT TRAINING

• Youth Empowerment Suriname Foundation (YES) is a Surinamese foundation that passionately and dedicatedly works to contribute to the personal development of young people between 15 and 22 years of age. The focus of this project is on young people from a vulnerable social environment and have an increased risk of school dropout. These people are trained through a mentorship program in personal development (selfconfidence, analytical and communication skills).

YOUTH WELFARE FOUNDATION/ SEMOCO FOUNDATION

• Homework Support to students of District Coronie. The Youth Welfare Foundation in collaboration with the Semoco Foundation tutors approximately 400 pupils of 4 primary schools with moderate or poor learning results in the subjects of arithmetic and Dutch language (reading). The skills acquired during this guidance trajectory can be applied in the participants' daily routines and take their school performance to a higher level. Workshops were held for the teachers to have the skills to provide better knowledge transfer to other students not included in this specific project.

EBGS WANHATTI & RKBO TAMARIN

Enhancing education through technology

These 2 schools in district Marowijne are equipped with essential technological tools including laptops, projectors and a reliable internet infrastructure, crucial for implementing effective distance learning. The teachers and students were also trained in using technological tools and digital platforms to maximize the benefits of the new learning environment.

BIO-STEM

Het Surinaams Knutsel Hoekje (HSKH) is an NGO that teaches Tribal & Indigenous

people in district Sipaliwini about STEM-education (Science, Technology, Engineering

and Mathematics). The project seeks to empower tribal and Indigenous communities in

this district by utilizing the strength of STEM education, equipping them with the

knowledge and resources to address local challenges effectively.

YOUTH INNOVATION ENTREPRENEURSHIP PROGRAM SURINAME

• This program focusses on the growth of 45 small businesses of young entrepreneurs

various sectors such as agriculture, chicken farming, beekeeping, art & craft, personal

care and Tourism.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DRAMBRANDERSGRACHT

Renovate the practical room of vocational school Drambrandersgracht.

This project allows the practical lessons, namely engineering, mechanical engineering, electrical engineering and GAWASA, to be carried out more efficiently. Furthermore,

pupils who participated in this project gained valuable practical knowledge.

HENDRIK SCHOOL

Renovation of the Hendrik school. The rear building of this school consists of 11

classrooms. These are in such a deplorable state that the school management was

forced to stop using those classrooms. This leads to a 50% decline of student enrollment

capacity. The total renovation costs are approximately USD 385,000.

RITFELD SCHOOL

 The purchase of a copy machine for the Ritfeld school, where teachers and 214 pupils will benefit from. This copier will be available for various purposes including printing assignments, handouts and study materials.

TOTTIKAMP (Saramacca)

 Needs Assessment of the watersystem of Tottikamp and surrounding area in District Saramacca.

A needs assessment is being conducted due to the continuous health related issues resulting from the lack of potable water. This project will cover a basic need for potable water for the community of Tottikamp and surrounding communities.

POLYTECNICAL COLLEGE SURINAME (PTC)

The upgrade of the Electrical and Mechanical Laboratory.

A healthy community is key to sustainable development. The Contractors have supported

various health initiatives, including infrastructure upgrades and equipment donations to

HUIZE ASHIANA

Woodlice control Elderly

Huize Ashiana is a nursing home for approximately 292 senior citizens. The facility is in

deplorable condition and needs to be renovated urgently, but the existing wood lice issue

needs to be taken care of beforehand.

ACADEMIC HOSPITAL

Medical Equipment Donation to AZP

This project involves critical medical equipment for the following departments: Quick

Response Team Cardiology, Orthopedic Department and the NICU/PICU department.

REGIONAL HEALTH SERVICES (RGD)

• Creating disease navigators serving vulnerable communities in Suriname.

This project aims to integrate public health promotion and disease prevention in

Suriname's RGD primary care facilities by ultimately building health service capacity

country wide. This project implements training to build knowledge of nurses and nurse

aids and implements a train of trainer model (ToT) for RGD health professionals to

ensure sustainability in the country.

MUNGRA MEDICAL CENTER (MMC)

 Upgrade of the emergency Room and the Children's Department with urgently needed stretchers, hospital beds, and essential medical equipment.

Upgrade of the dialysis facilities in the Internal Ward of the 's Lands Hospital. This will
increase the dialysis capacity of the hospital allowing more dialysis patients for hospital
admittance to be dialyzed. This will lead to less complications, decreased demand for
transportation outside the hospital and increased patient comfort.

Capacity building is essential for developing the skills and capabilities of the youth and young entrepreneurs to ensure their long-term success.

STICRIS - Women Shelter

Vegetables farming maintenance and training sponsoring OPEX 4 apartments
 The vegetable gardens are a huge success. The vegetable gardens offer the residents
 and their children healthier meal options. The residents harvest 2-3 times a week from
 the gardens, with a variety of vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers and
 seasonings. They are trained by Tiny Gardens in how to grow, nurse and harvest their
 vegetables and herbs.

1.4 LOCAL CONTENT

Investing in local content strengthens Suriname's business environment and boosts long-term social and economic development.

Bluewave Supplier Development (SD) Program 2nd Cohort

The aim of this program is to enhance the availability and utilization of local suppliers, foster a more competitive and mature supply market, and create more employment opportunities for national citizens. Thirty-Three companies took part in the 2nd cohort , which included workshops, guidance, and tools to help them understand the international standards demanded by major corporations and to support their development and compete for higher-value contracts. The total cost for the 2nd cohort was USD 117,000. This consists of Chevron's contribution of USD 87,000, of which USD 27,398 from its 2023 obligations and the remaining of its 2024 obligations and USD 1,000 by each of the 33 suppliers.

NATIN N6 Building Renovation

With the ongoing development of the NATIN educational institute there was a need for urgent renovation works in relation to building High-rise N6. The total renovation cost is USD 240,900. The contribution is done by: Chevron, Capricorn, Decker, TotalEnergies and Staatsolie.

1.5 ENVIRONMENT

Investing in the environment projects, through a social responsibility project is not just an ethical choice—it's a necessity for the long-term health and prosperity of our communities, economies, and the planet.

MANGROVE REHABILITATION PROJECT - MUD CREEPER

Acquisition of a mud-creeper will support the construction of the Sediment Trapping
Units. This would have a great positive impact on the conservation of the remaining
mangroves at the coast, mitigating the erosion rate and enhancing the rehabilitation
process.

AGROFORESTERY PROJECT IN BROKOPONDO - PHASE II

The aim of the agroforestry system is to rehabilitate the forest using commercially viable
fast growing timber species and fruit trees. This phase consists of Training monitoring
and coaching strategy for Agroforestry adoption in the Hinterlands of Suriname.

Sports programs have the power to unite communities and inspire individuals. One project was allocated to sports for the youth, fostering their development and future in sports.

CONDOR

Support Volleyball Club (Condor)
 Volleyball Club Condor has submitted a request for financial aid, backed by a plan to revive the club to a state where it can again attract qualified coaches and high potential players. A one-time aid package has been granted to Condor

Investing in art and culture is an important way to contribute to the enrichment of the Surinamese society. Art and culture are key to shaping national identity, promoting creativity, and fostering social cohesion.

MYTYL SCHOOL & HUIZE TYLTYL Fieldtrip

 A fieldtrip for the Mytyl School and Huize Tyltyl to a theater Show on the International Day of Persons with disabilities. Mytyl School and Huize Tyltyl attending live theater performance "'t is FF leuk" on December 3rd, 2024. The performing artists were also people with disabilities.

Community development initiatives aim to improve the quality of life for individuals and communities.

POLICE STATION CORANTIJN

The renovation of the Police Station Corantijn included painting both the interior and exterior of the building, including the detention area. Upgrades also involved improving sanitation in the cell area, pouring a new floor and replacing the wooden bed planks for prisoners.






Graph 3: SR Investments - TotalEnergies




Graph 5: SR Investments - Chevron



Graph 4: SR Investments APA




Graph 6: SR Investment - SHELL

4. CONCLUSION AND 2025 OUTLOOK

As of January 2025, SHI oversees 16 Production Sharing Contracts (PSCs), with a total obligation of USD 3.0 million.

To increase the **efficiency** and **effectiveness** of Social Responsibility and Investment (SRI) **initiatives** executed by Operators as per Production Sharing Contract (PSC) Obligation, the IOC's have established an SRI-IOC's Sub Committee. This Subcommittee will meet twice a year and have the following objectives:

- Enhance collaboration, alignment to optimize expenditure from IOCs
- Maximize benefit of Social Responsibility and Investment Development plans
- Share best practices on Social Responsibility and Investment activities
- Consider identifying areas of expertise and investments for each operator
- Increase communication between the Operators and Staatsolie Maatschappij Suriname N.V. with regard to Social Responsibility Investment developments.

The collaboration among IOC's by sharing projects in portfolio with each other will maximize the benefit and will create a positive impact, ensuring long-term benefits for all involved.

In conclusion, 2025 will mark a year of growth, stronger partnerships, and increased commitment to the social and economic development of Surinamese communities.

The role of the IOCs will continue to evolve, focusing on creating sustainable, lasting change that benefits all sectors of Surinamese society.
